It's illegal for the federal government to set up a national student data base, so they spent almost \$1 Billion to ensure many states (Including Nevada) have data bases that are compatible. According one Nevada K-12 Superintendent - the federal government can access Nevada's SAIN data base.

Both the ACLU and Tenth Amendment Center were against these longitudinal data bases.

In Nevada that data base is Infinite Campus, it is the largest data base ever created on U.S. students (HOLD UP Handout). The most incriminating IC data is uploaded to SAIN (Hold up). Neither IC or SAIN ever delete any student data.

IC and SAIN are full of subjective data including: Discipline, Minor Discipline, Counseling, and Psychiatric data; plus medical data.

Clark County is especially bad when it comes to protecting student data, they've already had two Ransomware attacks and when the District

refused to pay, as promised, the hacker posted the personal data of thousands of students on the web.

It is the belief of Protect Nevada Children that both Infinite Campus and SAIN have access to way too much data that has nothing to do with education. IC shares all the student data in their data base [on the students they serve] with some third-party vendors, including Community in Schools. For proof go to ProtectNevadaChildren.org. Washoe County won't tell us what additional vendors IC shares student data with.

Even if IC isn't involved in a **seventh** data breach, how will all this subjective data in the hands of IC, SAIN, and others affect the future of Nevada students?
